BIOGRAPHICAL NOTE

D.Y. Begay is a weaver, a daughter of a weaver's daughter. She is a Navajo born to Totsohini, the Big Water People, and born for Ta'chii'nii, the Red Earth Streak People. She resides in Teselani and Scottsdale. Arizona, with her husband and son.

She learned at an early age to shear sheep, card and spin wool, pick the plants for dyeing the fleece to obtain the varied and subtle colors in her weaving. As she says, "Everything in my weaving is natural. I use the same techniques passed from my ancestors to me to create designs that have artistic and traditional values."

D.Y. Begay has exhibited her weavings at the Indian Market in Santa Fe, New Mexico, and other important markets and museums throughout the United States. She was a contributor to the Smithsonians's *Woven by the Grandmothers: Nineteenth Century Navajo textiles from the National Museum of the American Indian* (1996). She participated as a traditional artist-in-residence for the Folklife Center at Crandall Public Library's *Navajo Exploration* project, co-hosted by the Hyde Collection Art Museum in the Fall of 1999.

Debbie Begay is the niece of weaver/educator D.Y. Begay. Her four small rugs were made as a part of the process of learning the tradition.
